SCHOOL NEWS

<u>India's Growing Influence in Global Diplomacy:</u> <u>Strategic Partnerships and Regional Leadership</u>



India officially has linkages with over 200 countries and has emerged as a significant player in contemporary geopolitics. The broad range of strategic relations illustrates historical relationships as well as practical calculations

US and India: After a long stand-off due to Cold War tensions, the US and India have established a close partnership. Significant defense partnership agreements such as COMCASA, big energy partnerships, and growing bilateral trade worth \$120 billion prove their partnership is growing in importance, with cooperation in AI, semiconductors, and clean/renewable energy.

Russia and India: India has made it clear that even whilst being scrutinized and pressured by the West to distance itself from Russia, it remains closely connected to Russia especially in defense and energy interests. India is purchasing S-400 missiles and securing discounted oil from Russia to sustain that relationship.

China and India: Trade between China and India is now worth more than \$100 billion, but not without challenges that have surfaced with tensions over border issues, as well as, China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI). In light of some of these challenges, India is trying to focus on partnerships within ASEAN and on African partnerships.

European Union and India: India has a well established trading relationship with the EU worth \$88 billion, and is trying to reinvigorate a free trade agreement between the two. France and Germany have become significant partners for India in defense and green technology.

Neighbourhood First Policy: India has placed value on regional stability via its Neighbourhood First Policy with grants of funding for infrastructure. Additionally, currently India has neighbourhood initiatives underway for disaster relief to its neighbours.

Big Changes in U.S. Trade: Implementation of new tariffs

New tariffs, or additional taxes on imported goods, were announced by President Donald Trump. Nearly all imports are now subject to a 10% duty, with the exception of those from Canada and Mexico, as they had been previously subjected to trade restrictions. Trump also introduced "reciprocal" tariffs, meaning if a country charges high taxes on American products, the U.S. government is bound to impose heavy taxes on American goods.

The biggest impact is on China, which now faces a huge 104% tariff after both countries raised their rates in a back-and-forth trade fight. A bewildering fact is that 10% tariffs have also been applied to islands where there are no human inhabitants, only penguins!

Clashes in Manipur: Displacement and Violence

Violent conflicts between the Kuki-Zo and Meitei communities have been occurring in Manipur since May 2023. About 60,000 people were relocated, thousands of homes and places of worship were destroyed, and 258 people have killed as of November 2024. Shortly after Chief Minister N. Biren Singh resigned in February 2025, violence resulted in the establishment of President's Rule. Peace efforts are in progress, and many families continue to recover.


