
Kashmir, a serene and peaceful place

The Festival That Feeds A Thousand Hands

I walk through the market during the week of Diwali and it feels as if the air itself is awake. Stalls spill into the street, their counters heavy with sweets, silks, and jewelry that catch the glow of a hundred lamps. Families press shoulder to shoulder, bargaining, laughing, carrying lists that grow longer with every turn. It is easy to think of this as only tradition - as worship, as celebration - but if you look closely, you can see how every thread of the festival ties itself to work and livelihood.

The sweet shop on the corner has hired two extra boys to stir the giant pans of syrup. The woman who weaves garlands sits with her daughters, their hands quick and practiced, marigolds becoming money one string at a time. They remind us that the economy is not an abstract graph but something alive, breathing through the footsteps in crowded lanes and the rustle of money folded into palms. In the light of the festival, we glimpse a simple truth: celebration is also sustenance. The joy of the season feeds not only hearts but households, turning tradition into tomorrow's bread.

THINGS AROUND US

1. Trump hikes H-1B visa fees to \$100,000; India says move will have 'humanitarian consequences.'

The order takes effect at midnight on September 20, New York time; the MEA directs all Indian missions to provide all possible assistance to Indian nationals travelling back to the U.S. within the next 24 hours. In a move that is likely to disrupt the mobility of skilled workers from India to the United States, U.S. President Donald Trump sharply raised the price of the H-1B visa from the current \$2,000-\$5,000 range to a flat \$100,000, or almost ₹90 lakh.

2. India Launches "GST Bachat Utsav" to Reduce Cost of Essentials.

India's 'GST Bachat Utsav' will launch on September 22, 2025, coinciding with the Navratri festival. This initiative introduces a simplified Goods and Services Tax (GST) structure comprising two tax slabs: 5% and 18%, replacing the previous four slabs. The reforms aim to reduce the cost of essential items such as milk and ghee, ease household expenses, and stimulate consumption during the festive season.

3. H3N2 flu outbreak in Delhi-NCR.

Delhi-NCR is witnessing a sharp rise in flu-like infections, with the H3N2 strain appearing as the main culprit. A LocalCircles survey reveals nearly 70% of households in Delhi, Noida, Gurugram, Faridabad, and Ghaziabad are affected. H3N2 usually starts with high fever, chills, sore throat, cough, headache, fatigue, and body aches. Nasal congestion is common, while children may also experience nausea or diarrhoea. Recovery often takes 7–10 days, though lingering cough and weakness are frequently reported.

Nine nights are dedicated to celebrating Navratri, each honoring a distinct manifestation of Goddess Durga. It begins with Shailaputri, the daughter of the mountains, and Brahmacharini, the goddess of devotion. The third day is dedicated to Chandraghanta, a symbol of courage, fierce with a crescent moon. While Kushmanda is the universe's energy source, Skandamata is Lord Kartikeya's mother, and Katyayani is the fierce warrior. 
